
Promoting Literacy in Nyanga



Education in South Africa

- South African Schools Act of 1996
 - All have the right to a General Education from Grade 1 to Grade 12
 - Uniform set of standards that organizes funding for all schools
- ❖ 2010-2011 R165 billion of nation's GDP (5.3% of GDP and 20% of total expenditure)- one of the highest in the world
- July of 2010- measures to increase number of no-fee schools
- Aim to have all children attend Grade R

Education in South Africa

- Goal to greatly improve % of learners who obtain minimum acceptance mark in national assessment for Language and Mathematics
- Most recent initiative- Schooling 2025
 - Teacher recruitment, learner enrollment, school funding, literacy, overall quality of education
- Mother-tongue-based bilingual education

The Problem

- English literacy in the township schools is severely lacking
- Lack of consistency in language use
- Students are not gaining the necessary reading and writing skills to achieve a higher education
- ❖ Teachers are overworked and undertrained- unable to give individual attention to learners

Race Disparity in Education

- * 18% of blacks finish high school, compared to 65% of whites
- ❖ In South Africa in 2008, 70% of blacks and less than 5% of whites living in poverty
- External factors contribute to the poor performance of students in the mainly Black townships
 - Prevalence of HIV/AIDS
 - Crime rate
 - Poverty
 - Gangs/lack of positive role models

Benefits of Literacy

- Enables one to join new social spheres
- Progressing through the South African education system- passing the matriculation examination and reaching university level
- Entering the workforce, and thus fighting unemployment
- Stronger communication skills needed for the workforce
- Building of confidence in students

Benefits on Community

- Reduction in poverty
- * Economic and community development
- * Reduction in crime and violence
- Decrease in marginalization

What is needed

- More individualized work with students
- More quality teacher-education
- Assistance for teachers in overcrowded classrooms
- More time allocated for English literacy
- ❖ Positive role-models with enthusiasm and passion for the betterment of our youth

Our plan

- ❖ Implement a program through the University of the Western Cape's Education Faculty with students performing at lower than grade-level in Nyanga's primary schools
- Compulsory bi-weekly reading and writing tutoring sessions after school
- One-on-one or small group work focused on the improvement of English literacy based on their individual needs

Making Change

- Partially alleviates teachers of their excessive responsibilities
- ❖ Better prepares our future teachers to work in the areas of South Africa where we have seen sub par academic performance
- Involving parents and community facilitates support at home
- Help learners understand the value of literacy and education
